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KNF-7 | 5 Firecraft Hacks for the Fallout

Stay Sealed, Stay Clever

Tinder Cache:

Grab dry grass, bark, cattail fluff, or dryer lint. Smear cotton balls with grease—store in a waterproof tin with desiccant. Your spark's lifeline.

Spark Savy:

Ferro rod or busted battery with steel wool. Cracked magnifier works if you've got patience. Ignite fast, feed slow.

Teepee Lay:

Stack tinder in a teepee shape—good airflow, quick start. Feed honest, no flash. Keeps you warm all night.

Fire Burrito:

Wrap tight stick bundle in bark. Burns low and slow—perfect for long hauls.

Signal Smoke:

Toss green veg on the flame—thick smoke calls help. Use stealth if eyes are near.

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KNF-7 | FIRE PROTOCOL

Build Tinder Box:

Pack dry grass, char cloth, or corn chips in a sealed tin. Keep it dry—your first spark depends on it.

Strike Smart:

Use flint, ferro rod, or battery/wool. Coat cotton balls in jelly for a slow burn.

Lay It Right:

Teepee for speed, log cabin for control, lean-to for wind. Start small, feed steady.

Safety First:

Clear space, ring with stones, dig a pit. Smother with soil—check heat before leaving.

Long Burn Hack:

Wrap stick bundle in bark—fire burrito lasts through the dark.

KNF-7 | FALLOUT FIRE RULES

Stay Sealed, Stay Clever

DO:

**Stack tinder dry—grass or lint ignites true.
Build teepee for fast flame—airflow wins.
Smother with sand—water's a luxury.
Use reflectors—heat where you need it.
Signal with smoke—green veg draws eyes.**

DON'T:

**Waste sparks on show—fuel's finite.
Skip the pit—wildfire kills.
Poke the fire—let it breathe.
Ignore wind—lean-to or bust.
Leave it hot—check with your hand.**

KNF-7 | Workshop Wisdom from the Ashes

KNF-7 FIELD NOTE // DREG'POPS' MADDUX

TOPIC: CHARCOAL, HOMEMADE.

Don't pay good ammo for charcoal when you can make it yourself.

All you need's dry wood, a fire pit, and a lid that blocks air. Hardwood's best-oak, maple, hickory if you're lucky. No paint, no poison. Just wood.

Build a small fire and let it catch. Once it's burnin' steady, choke it. Cover the top with a metal lid, dirt, or old sheet metal-anything that cuts off oxygen. You want heat without flame. That's how you get charcoal, not ash. Let it smolder low and slow -couple hours, maybe more, dependin' on your pile. Once it cools, break it up. That's your black gold. Good for filterin' water, feedin' soil, or smudgin' your face before a night run.

Don't forget:

NO AIR CHARCOAL. TOO MUCH AIR =
NOTHIN' BUT DUST AND REGRET.

Stay smart. Stay scorched.
